Commissioning was also streamed over Zoom so all members of the Clinton Franciscan Family had the opportunity to attend as a means to be together and present with one another.

As part of the service,

Associates recommitted themselves to living Gospel and Franciscan values in partnership with the Sisters of St. Francis for an additional three years.



— Bishop Turley Visits Clinton

We, the Sisters of St. Francis, welcomed Bishop Daniel Turley, O.S.A, newly-retired Bishop of the Diocese of Chulucanas, Peru, to Clinton at the end of the July. It had been two years since his last in-person visit to The Canticle.

Bishop Turley celebrated Mass at The Canticle and at Prince of Peace Parish. (Prince of Peace Parish serves as a sister parish to La Virgin Pura y Limpia in Sapillica, Peru.)

A longtime friend of the Clinton Franciscans, Bishop Turley ministered in Peru nearly five decades alongside our sisters, particularly Sister Phyllis Morris.

In 1965, four Sisters of St. Francis opened the mission in the Diocese of Chulucanas, and sisters served in schools, parishes, and the chancery office until 2018.

Bishop Turley arrived in Peru in 1969, shortly after his ordination into the priesthood. He was ordained a

bishop in 1996 and served as coadjutor to Bishop John McNabb, O.S.A, founding bishop of the diocese. In 2000, Bishop Turley became diocesan bishop.

"There has been great progress and improvement since our arrival in Peru," he

explained regarding the conditions in the Diocese of Chulucanas. "In the 1960s, there were maybe seven schools for the 120 towns. Now, there are 120 schools, one in each town. There were no high schools — now there are 12 to 14 high schools." There is more

Both Lori and Sharon look forward to spending more time with family, especially grandchildren and, for Sharon, a great-grandchild.



Like everyone else, the <u>Franciscan Peace Connection</u> team adapted quickly to the COVID-19 restrictions. Cobwebs were more common than people in meeting places! Zoom and conference calls not only saved time and gas, they increased networking opportunities.

A Course in Miracles, a unique spiritual program designed to awaken us to the truth of our oneness with God and Love, continued weekly thanks to Zoom. Monday Mindfulness met in July for the first time in sixteen months, and will meet bi-weekly going forward.

The Franciscan Peace Connection continues to offer outreach to persons living on the margins. The best news is that the two churches who hosted marginalized

persons bi-weekly are allowed to reestablish all their indoor hospitalities: sit-down breakfast, shopping, hair cuts, showers, networking, and more.

Our many interfaith partners helped make the 5th annual Interfaith Awareness Week the best one so far and opened several doors for more collaboration in the fall.

The <u>Campaign Nonviolence Week of Action</u> (September 18-26) is our next big San Diego-wide focus. Countless individuals, local peace and justice groups, city officials, and state representatives are organizing a variety of challenges, trainings, and around-the-table efforts to build bridges and promote dialogue.

Francis on September 8, 1946, and
received the name Mary Therese Martin
at her reception on June 16, 1947. She
later resumed use of her baptismal
name. She made her first profession on
August 12, 1949, and perpetual profession on

Sister Bea earned a bachelor's degree in education with minors in history and biology from San Diego College for Women, San Diego, California, and a master's degree in education with a minor in special education from Peabody College, Nashville, Tennessee. She received a second master's degree in religious studies from Seattle University, Seattle, Washington.

She began her teaching career at St. Gerald School, Oak Lawn, Illinois, where she taught second grade for five years. She later returned to St. Gerald School to serve as principal for six years.

The majority of Sister Bea's ministry was in California where she served as an educator and administrator at St. Catherine of Alexandria School, Riverside; St. Kieran School, El Cajon; Christ the King School, Oildale; St. Hyacinth Academy, San Jacinto; and Holy Rosary Academy, San Bernardino.

When Sister Bea returned to Clinton, Iowa, in 2004, she served as the official driver for sisters who were unable to drive. She then became the Coordinator of Assisted Living, which involved visiting sisters at The Alverno and shopping for them.

Sister Bea currently resides at The Canticle in Clinton.

She also holds a certificate in Cultural and Creation Spirituality from Holy Names College, Oakland, California.

For thirty-three years, Sister Donna ministered as a teacher and principal at schools in four states, including: St. Rita School, Cameron, Missouri; St. Ann School, Vail, Iowa; St. Columbkille School, Varina, Iowa; St. Kieran School, Chicago Heights, Illinois; Thorton Community College, South Holland, Illinois; St. Patrick School, Maysville, Kentucky; St. Patrick School, Clinton, Iowa; and Seton School, Clinton, Iowa.

She was appointed Director of Vocation/Formation at Mount St. Clare Convent in 1989, and Director of the Associate Partnership Program. Sister Donna relocated to Jesup, Iowa, in 1996 and accepted a position as Pastoral Associate at St. Athanasius Parish, where she served for twenty years until her "retirement" in 2016. She moved to Chicago, Illinois, for one year before returning to Clinton.

Currently residing at The Canticle in Clinton, she voluntarily ministers to the elderly through visits to members of Prince of Peace Parish who are in nursing homes, skilled care, or homebound.

Sister Maria Zeimen was born in Mapleton, Iowa, and graduated from Denison Public High School in Denison, Iowa. She entered the Sisters of St. Francis on September 8, 1951, and received the name Maria Goretti at her reception on June 18, 1952. She later asked to be known simply as Maria. She

made her first profession on August 12, 1954, and her final profession on August 12, 1957.

She earned a bachelor's degree in general science from the University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa, and a doctorate in animal biology from the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C.

She began a career in education teaching second grade at St. Gerald School, Oak Lawn, Illinois, and then high school science and math at Our Lady of Good Counsel, Fonda, Iowa. After obtaining her doctorate, she taught biology for sixteen years at Mount St. Clare College and Academy in Clinton, Iowa.

From 1980 to 1988, Sister Maria served as Pastoral Minister and teacher at St. Paul School and Parish in Macomb, Illinois, and as Pastoral Minister at Christ the King in Moline, Illinois.

Answering the call to congregational leadership, Sister Maria served as Vice President of the Sisters of St. Francis from 1976 to 1980, and again from 1984 to 1988. She served as President from 1988 to 1996, helping lead the congregation in choosing active nonviolence as its mission.

In 1993, Sister Maria was elected Vice President of the Franciscan Federation of the United States and served two years as its President beginning in 1995.

After her terms in congregational leadership, Sister Maria, as Community Leader, helped in founding L'Arche Chicago. She has also worked with L'Arche communities in Mobile, Alabama; Orange, California; Jacksonville, Florida; Clinton, Iowa; Bradford, Massachusetts; Kansas City, Missouri; and Spokane, Washington. She served as the Assistant Regional Coordinator of Central L'Arche USA from 2006 to 2011.

Currently residing in Chicago, Illinois, Sister Maria volunteers with VoteForward, Interfaith Community for Detained Immigrants, and Garden Center Services. She also helps with assistant and staff formation for L'Arche communities.

Moving to California in 2004, she promoted active nonviolence and peacemaking while working as an Operations Coordinator for Atwood and Thompson, Inc. in Spring Valley.

Sister LaVern co-founded the Franciscan Peace Connection in La Mesa, California, in 2012. The Franciscan Peace Connection continues today as an outreach ministry of the Sisters of St. Francis offering opportunities for workshops, study groups, and training in active nonviolence, peacemaking, and life skills.

Sister LaVern resides in Lakeside, California, where she ministers as the director of the Franciscan Peace Connection, networks with numerous interfaith groups, and provides outreach to persons living on the margins. She serves as president of the 2021 board of directors of the Peace Resource Center of San Diego, where she works closely with other groups and organizations who promote nonviolence, peace, justice, equality, and equity for all.

Sister Barbara Rosener was born in Breda, Iowa, and graduated from Kuemper High School in Carroll, Iowa. She entered the Sisters of St. Francis on September 8, 1961, and received the name Mary Barbara at her reception on June 16, 1962. She pronounced perpetual vows on August 12, 1967.

She earned a bachelor's degree in education from Marycrest College, Davenport, Iowa, and a master's degree in religious education from Seattle University, Seattle, Washington.

Sister Barbara served forty-three years as a teacher in four states, including: St. La Salle School, Reedley, California; St. Patrick School, Rochelle, Illinois; St. Catherine of Alexandria School, Riverside, California; St. Francis de Paula School, Chicago, Illinois; St. Patrick School, Maysville, Kentucky; St. Gerald School, Oak Lawn, Illinois; Holy Cross School, Vail, Iowa; and St. Edmond School, Fort Dodge, Iowa.

Between her terms in congregational leadership, Sister Jan worked as the U.S. Liaison for *Global Sisters Report* in Kansas City, Missouri.

Sister Jan is a board member for *A Nun's Life* ministry and is a longtime advocate for social justice. She currently resides at The Canticle in Clinton.

Bob committed to living the gospel and Franciscan values in association with the Sisters of St. Francis by becoming an Associate on October 20, 1996.

As the owner of a travel agency outside of Chicago, Illinois, Bob was instrumental in arranging pilgrimages to Assisi, Italy – birthplace of Saints Francis and Clare – for the sisters. He also arranged trips to Chulucanas, Peru, where the Sisters of St. Francis ministered from 1965 to 2018.

opportunity for education too, as girls are being educated where, earlier on, it was primarily boys.

"The people of Peru have been so thankful for the many blessings," Bishop Turley exclaimed. "There have been major improvements in roads... medical centers... water sources... electricity." Most households have a television, internet, or cell phone. "Much like Americans, the people of Peru love their communication devices," he chuckled.

On April 2, 2020, it was announced that Pope Francis had accepted the resignation of Bishop Turley from the pastoral care of the Diocese of Chulucanas on having reached the age of retirement. Reverend Cristóbal

Bernardo Mejía Corral of the clergy of the Diocese of Lurín, Peru, was named his successor. He was ordained a bishop in December 2020 by Bishop Turley.

Back in the United States since April 2021, Bishop Turley now lives in community at St. Rita Parish in Chicago, Illinois. "I feel at home at St. Rita's ministering to an immigrant population. It is nice to be able to continue to speak Spanish with parishioners."

When asked what his greatest challenge was in returning to the United States, he expressed the reality of living in Chicago with the surrounding gun violence. "I know we have prayed for Peru, but we also need to pray for Chicago," he urged.

Bob helped open, and later manage, the Mission's halfway house for men struggling with substance abuse. The house offered treatment and free room and board for those needing temporary help. He retired from St. Mary's Mission in the spring of 2015 after eighteen years of service.

"Being an Associate has enriched my life. It really helped me mentally while working on the reservation," Bob added. In August, he renewed his commitment to the Associate Partnership Program for another three years as a member of the Chicago region. He currently resides in DeKalb, Illinois.



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
