

Campaign Nonviolence Jeopardy Game Setup and Instruction Guide

Overview:

Welcome to Campaign Nonviolence Jeopardy! The <u>Franciscan Peace Center</u> has created this game as a unique way to explore key issues related to nonviolence, human rights, climate justice, income inequality, and racism. Modeled after the popular quiz show, this version challenges participants to test their knowledge and raise awareness about the critical themes that shape <u>Campaign Nonviolence</u> – a project of Pace e Bene.

Designed for both individual play and group competition, Campaign Nonviolence Jeopardy can be enjoyed in a variety of settings, from small gatherings to larger events such as school activities, church gatherings, or community events. The game features three rounds with a total of 75 questions, making it an interactive and engaging experience for all.

Whether you're playing for fun or using it as an educational tool, this game is a powerful way to spark discussion and deepen understanding of the nonviolence movement. Follow the instructions on this sheet to set up the game for group play and join us in promoting peace and justice!



1. Equipment Needed:

Laptop or Smartphone:

Use a laptop or smartphone to run the game.

Projector or TV:

 The game must be projected onto a wall or displayed on a TV screen so that all participants can see.

HDMI Cable or Wireless Streaming Device:

o Connect your laptop or smartphone to the projector or TV using an HDMI cable or a wireless streaming device like Chromecast, Apple TV, etc.

Stable Internet Connection:

 Ensure your device has a stable internet connection to access the game website.

Table for Contestants:

Set up a table with seating for contestants during each of the three rounds.

Buzzer System or Signaling Device:

o Provide a method for contestants to signal when they know the answer. This could be physical buzzers, raising hands, or a simple noise-making device.

2. Game Setup:

Step 1: Access the Game Website

- Open the game website on your laptop or smartphone: https://clintonfranciscans.com/campaign-nonviolence-jeopardy.
- Ensure that the device is connected to the internet and that the game screen is visible on the laptop or smartphone.

Step 2: Connect to Projector or TV

- Connect your device to a projector or TV using an HDMI cable or a wireless streaming device.
- Adjust the display settings on your device so that the game screen is clearly visible to the entire group.

Step 3: Set Up Contestants' Table

- Arrange a table at the front of the room with seating for contestants.
- Make sure there is enough space for participants to comfortably see the screen and interact with the host.



Step 4: Prepare Signaling Devices

 Distribute signaling devices to each contestant. These can be physical buzzers, hand signals, or simple noise-making devices like a bell or a whistle.

3. Running the Game:

Step 1: Assign Roles

Host:

- o The host is responsible for reading the questions aloud, calling on contestants who signal, and confirming answers.
- The host should also manage the flow of the game, ensuring all contestants have a fair chance to participate.

Assistant (optional):

 An assistant can help reveal the answers on the computer or phone and manage the technical aspects of the game.

Step 2: Start the Game

- Begin by allowing the first contestant to choose a category and dollar amount.
- The host reads the question aloud as it is revealed on the screen.

Step 3: Contestants Signal

- Contestants signal when they think they know the answer.
- The host calls on the contestant who signaled first to provide their answer.

Step 4: Reveal the Answer

- The host or assistant reveals the correct answer on the computer or phone.
- If the contestant's answer is correct, they earn the dollar amount for that question. If incorrect, another contestant may have the opportunity to answer, depending on your house rules.

Step 5: Continue the Game

- The contestant who answered correctly chooses the next category and dollar amount.
- The host or assistant then reveals the next question, and the game continues.



4. Game Flow and Management Tips:

- Pacing:
 - Keep the game moving at a steady pace to maintain engagement.
- Fair Play:
 - Ensure all contestants have an equal opportunity to participate.
- Audience Engagement:
 - Encourage the audience to cheer and support the contestants.
- Tie-Breakers:
 - o Have a plan for handling tie situations, such as a final question or a quick quiz.

5. Concluding the Game:

- **Final Scores:**
 - o Announce the final scores and congratulate all contestants for their participation.
- Prizes (optional):
 - o Consider awarding small prizes to the winning contestant or participants.
